Three years ago, our district had very limited technological abilities. Internet speeds were very slow. Our teachers were using blackboards and chalk and overhead projectors. Today, the district is in a fully wireless environment.

Over the past three years, we have made a

concerted effort to equip our schools with the technological tools needed for students

LCD/ smart boards and document cameras typify the Cumberland classroom. This fall our "1 to 1 computer Chrome Book" initiative gets underway to truly transform teaching and learning in the district. Google Docs, technology coaches, and increased internet bandwidth are all requirements for teaching and learning in the 21st century and Cumberland is ready.

As we made and continue to make these improvements to our classroom model, we are cognizant that technology for technology's sake is not the answer. We have improved our schools greatly in recent years, and continue to make them even better by using all available technology to fundamentally change how teachers teach and how our students learn.

As our 1 to 1 Chrome Book initiative begins this fall at our middle schools we will see the transition from teachers directing instruction largely from the front of the room, to teachers facilitating learning of students moving about the classroom working with students. "One to one" teaching and learning - the relationship built between the student and the teacher – has always been a key ingredient in student success. Increasing the amount of time each teacher spends with each student not only improves the classroom environment and builds self-esteem in the students, but it helps the teacher better understand the strengths and weaknesses of each student. What's more, it helps teachers to truly differentiate their instruction to each student, and to better challenge each and every student at their ability level.

Our teachers and administrators are very excited about these changes. We hope you are too.



CUMBERLAND MIDDLE SCHOOLS LAUNCH 1:1 CHROMEBOOK INITIATIVE

This fall, Cumberland Middle School students will be receiving a different type of book when they go back to school.

All 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students will receive Chromebooks for use during the day and at home on nights and weekends, ensuring that Cumberland students are learning the types of skills necessary to succeed in high school, college, and beyond.

"Right now, we know that our students need to be ahead of the curve when it comes to computer technology, and we feel strongly that this effort will not only help students gain the computer literacy they need, but will also save the district money by not having to buy costly new textbooks every few years," explained Superintendent Phil Thornton. "Only a handful of other districts in Rhode Island and in New England for that matter have taken the 1:1 model to the middle school level. Further proof that Cumberland is not only doing more with less, but leading the way in 21st century education."



Why does the Cumberland School Department believe that a 1:1 program is important?

The Cumberland School Department believes that education including the process of learning and being productive, should replicate real world applications. We feel it is our responsibility to prepare our students for the expectations currently taking place in a global society. Technology, by 21st century standards, is vital to achieving the expectations established by the Common Core State Standards. Access and use of technology is paramount to the success of our students as they further their education and ultimately enter the workforce.

Why Chromebooks?

Chromebooks represent a new technology device. The Chromebook needs little, if any maintenance. It is a completely web based device so there is no need for downloading or installing device updates. The way a Chromebook operates reduces the need for technical support. Student work on the Chromebook automatically is saved to the Google Drive, requiring less local district data storage.

In what ways will Chromebooks be used in the classroom?

The entire middle school faculty received a two-day intensive training focused on Google applications and extensions that will be used to enhance the learning experience. Plans are under development to provide ongoing training through our instructional technology coaches in order to support our teachers throughout the school year. District and building level leaders will be working closely with the faculty and staff of both middle schools to make sure we are using the Chromebooks to their fullest potential to enhance instruction.

CHS NAMES JOSH LIMA HEAD FOOTBALL COACH



Cumberland High School Principal Alan Tenreiro has named Joshua Lima the Clippers head football coach. "This is a great opportunity," said Lima, who spent the last five years as La Salle Academy's offensive coordinator. "People know Cumberland football. It's a great program, a winning tradition, a place that has had a lot of success and I'm excited to build on that success."

Lima, who grew up in Cranston, graduated from La Salle, and earned a business degree from Sacred Heart University, said he knows he has his work cut out for him. The Clippers are moving from Division II to Division I this fall, where they will be competing against the best teams in the state. The Clippers finished last season 9-4 under Coach Skurka in Divison II.

"It's going to be difficult (competing against the top public and private schools in the state), but the big thing is going to be making sure we're giving our max effort and competing," he said.

Lima said he has already watched game tape from last year, and is excited to coach the players coming back this fall. Besides getting the team ready, Lima said he is hoping to get the fans ready for the season. He is hoping the team's performance will put fans in the stands. "I want to get everyone excited about this team, even people who haven't been to a game in 20 or 30 years," he said.

"The students make teaching special. Everyday I wake up and go to a job that I love. I have the privilege of spending my day with children who are inquisitive, hard workers, and always try their best."

The selection committee pointed to Ms. Parenteau's "dedication to the BF Norton community, including colleagues, parents, and especially students, her commitment to and empathy for ELL students, in part because of her personal background as a former ELL student, and the strong differentiation skills demonstrated on a daily basis. Ms Parenteau has been recognized by

One of the reasons for Cumberland High School's success in recent years has been our community's annual initiative to embrace a school-wide concept and incorporate into every day of the school year. Not only does this endeavor strengthen

our community as a whole, but more importantly, the practice has proven to help students find purpose and meaning in their own high school experience. The results have been overwhelmingly positive, with increases in academic achievement, graduation rates, and the number of students gaining admission to some of the best colleges in the country.

Last year, the CHS community focused on "the power of one": What if we all asked the same question? What if we all answered it together? How could a question change our life at CHS?

How could our answers affect the world beyond our campus? For our students, part of the process of growing up is what some people call "finding yourself," which simply means finding or discovering your "best self," the "you" that has something special to give the world. For both staff and students, it was a transformational experience.

This year, the CHS community wants to "pay it forward". Based on the philosophy from ancient Greece, rekindled by Benjamin Franklin, and in Lily Hardy Hammond's 1916 novel "In the Garden of Delight", the theory gained prominence in the book by Catherine Ryan Hyde and movie released in 2000 starring Kevin Spacey and Helen Hunt.

For 2014-15, every member of our CHS community will focus on the philosophy of paying it forward, of doing favors for others and expecting not something in return, but that the person who received the favor will in kind turn and do three favors for others. It is exciting to think of the difference we can make in the lives of those around us. This year, the classroom, the art room, the athletic fields, the hallways, the Cumberland community as a whole, will be our laboratory for this experiment and experience.

Julienne Lambaer's late husband loved his country, he loved Cumberland, and he loved Cumberland High School. And so she thought it only fitting that the American flag presented to her by the United States for her husband's service to country during World War II be given to the school he helped build.

On July 2, in honor of Independence Day, Ms. Lambaer came to CHS and presented Principal Alan Tenreiro with the flag.

"He was very patriotic," Ms. Lambaer said. "He was very much a true American. He'd be proud to know this flag is here."

As a U.S. Marine, Cpl. Henry Lambaer served in the Pacific Theater during World War II, and when he came home, he was active in the American Legion. He was also on the School Committee when construction for the new Cumberland High School was approved.

"This is a tremendous honor," Mr. Tenreiro said. "We will have this flag on display here at CHS, where it will serve as an example of service to community and country."

All five of Ms. Lambaer's children are graduates of CHS. In 2013, her granddaughter, Nicolette Bernardi, also graduated from CHS. "I think Mr. Tenreiro and the superintendent have really turned things around at the high school," she said. "From everything I read and hear and see they're doing a really good job."

TRANSFORMATION OF A SCHOOL DISTRICT: CUMBERLAND SCHOOLS BEGINNING TO EXCEL



Throughout the years, I have had the good fortune of listening to graduation remarks from members of the student body. Anecdotal statements about school climate and personal experiences often provide a helpful insight into the internal workings of our schools. This June, CHS's 2014 Class salutatorian Elena Rittling, spoke of the "complete transformation" of Cumberland High School and how, over the last four years, "with the help of the teachers, and a bit of our own internal will, the school became a better place." I am proud to be able to share that wonderful observation with all of you.

As we get ready for a new school year, I would like to welcome back our students, families and staff to our transformed (and transforming) school district. I would also like to offer a warm welcome to the more than 165 new students who have enrolled in our PK-12 program. With seventy new middle school students and an increase in overall district enrollment, it's clear that the Cumberland School District provides attractive and

respected academic, athletic and artistic programs.

Our administrators and teachers have established forward momentum by addressing many of the school-related, community-wide concerns with an approach that simultaneously targets academics, school culture, and athletics. Singled out by RIDE as one of a half-dozen school districts statewide that are excelling at meeting the needs of the community, along with other indicators that evaluate results and efficiencies, I am confident that the district will continue to transform itself into one offering an outstanding academic experience to all students.

Our transformation is by no means complete. With support of the town council and the mayor, we are expanding student exposure to sciences and technologies through the addition of Project Lead the Way's biomedical science pathway at the high school and Chrome books that will transform learning for all middle school students. Additionally, we are restoring our middle school band program and funding of our middle school sports program. We also welcome a new, full-time athletic director to the district. CHS will see the addition of AP courses in studio art, microeconomics and geography which increases AP course offerings to twenty. Finally, targeted professional development will enable our teachers to leverage available technology and further enhance their teaching skills.

These initiatives, combined with student and parent support, will continue the transformation of the Cumberland School District.

CUMBERLAND ADDING SWIM CLASSES TO PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND HEALTH CURRICULUM AT CHS



Cumberland High School is incorporating swim lessons into health and wellness programs, further establishing the school as a leader in 9-12 education standards.

"Our aquatics program, as part of our Health and Wellness initiatives, will teach children selfconfidence and encourage physical fitness in a wellrounded way," said CHS Principal Alan Tenreiro. "And the courses are designed to develop valuable leadership and teamwork skills for our students."

Through teaching the sport of swimming and also in providing opportunities for competition, canoe training, and safety certification, the Aquatics Program provides instruction in a lifetime sport, school officials say.

"We will be expanding programming to offer a variety of levels of swimming instruction, water safety instruction, and lifeguard training," Mr. Tenreiro said.

Carolyn Dooley, CHS's Interdisciplinary Coordinator for Unified Arts, said the aquatics program, when incorporated into the physical education curriculum, positions CHS to meet national fitness and nutiriton standards. "The swim curriculum will include learning the basics strokes, such as freestyle and backstroke; treading water; and being able to swim a prescribed distance," Ms. Dooley said.

PE/Health teachers will receive training by professional aquatics instructors focused on a customized swim curriculum, according to school officials.

"Swimming is important life skill, a skill that can save your life," said Marshall Muir, executive director of Envious Swimming, the aquatics professionals who operate the pool at CHS and will be involved in the training, curriculum, and professional development . "It also helps fight obesity and is a low impact high intensity sport so it is better than many sports for the body as a whole. In Rhode Island, we have more than 400 miles of coast line and almost every block has a pool on it, so learning to swim in order to keep children safe truly is a necessity."

How has the Cumberland School Department prepared for this initiative?

Teachers have received training on a variety of topics associated with Google Apps for Education. The Cumberland School Department has also strengthened its wireless infrastructure over the past several years in order to accommodate a 1:1 program. 








2014-15 - NEW REPORT CARD


This fall, the Cumberland Middle Schools will be utilizing a standards based report card. The decision to move to a standards based report card is consistent with our newly adopted grading policy for students grades K-8. This new report card reflects the shift to common core state standards.

A standards-based report card is a proficiency-based reporting system. Students and their families will know how well they are performing with respect to standards associated with each course. Once students have this information they can create a plan to work on the areas where they are not meeting standards or areas where they are and need to be challenged.

CHS LEADING THE WAY: ADDING STATE OF THE ART BIOMEDICAL PROGRAM THIS FALL

Cumberland High School is poised to become just the second high school in Rhode Island to offer biomedical science classes to students.

"We're pleased that so many of our students are interested in the life sciences, technology and engineering," said CHS Principal Alan Tenreiro. "It is an exciting field. This new program is nationally recognized and will help our students get a step ahead of their peers when competing for college and careers related to our statewide economic priorities." More than 27 students have signed up for the classes this fall.

Ponaganset High School is the only other Rhode Island school to offer the biomedical careers pathway program, and just three schools in Massachusetts offer the program,



according to Dr. Carolyn Malstrom, senior director of school engagement for Project Lead The Way, Inc.

Project Lead The Way is the nation's leading provider of science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) programs. Through world-class K-12 curriculum, high-quality teacher professional development, and outstanding partnerships, PLTW is helping students develop the skills needed to succeed in the global economy.

The rigorous and relevant four-course PLTW Biomedical Science sequence allows students to investigate the roles of biomedical professionals as they study the concepts of human medicine, physiology, genetics, microbiology, and public health. Students engage in activities like investigating the death of a fictional person to learn content in the context of real-world cases. They examine the structures and interactions of human body systems and explore the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of disease, all while working collaboratively to understand and design solutions to the most pressing health challenges of today and the future.

Curriculum highlights include:

Principles of Biomedical Science

In the introductory course of the PLTW Biomedical Science program, students explore concepts of biology and medicine to determine factors that led to the death of a fictional person. While investigating the case, students examine autopsy reports, investigate medical history, and explore medical treatments that might have prolonged the person's life. The activities and projects introduce students to human physiology, basic biology, medicine, and research processes while allowing them to design their own experiments to solve problems.



Human Body Systems

Students examine the interactions of human body systems as they explore identity, power, movement, protection, and homeostasis. Exploring science in action, students build organs and tissues on a skeletal "Maniken"; use data acquisition software to monitor body functions such as muscle movement, reflex and voluntary action, and respiration; and take on the roles of biomedical professionals to solve real-world medical cases.

Medical Interventions

Students follow the life of a fictitious

family as they investigate how to prevent, diagnose, and treat disease. Students explore how to detect and fight infection; screen and evaluate the code in human DNA; evaluate cancer treatment options; and prevail when the organs of the body begin to fail. Through real-world cases, students are exposed to a range of interventions related to immunology, surgery, genetics, pharmacology, medical devices, and diagnostics.

News and notes from around the Cumberland Public Schools

SCHOOL SAFETY

Safety upgrades to all schools in the District are nearing completion. Doors have been replaced on both the interiors and exteriors of many classrooms and schools. A Keyless swipe access system is now in place at all schools. Keys that are still in use in the District have been replaced and secured through a bonded key system. Additional security cameras and other school safety measures have also been put in place to provide students and faculty with an extra layer of security. The District Safety Committee, comprised of school, police and fire personnel meet on a regular basis to stay vigilant with any new developments in this area.

TECHNOLOGY

All schools in the District now enjoy a wireless capacity. The instalation of LCDs and document cameras at the middle schools was completed this past spring. The high school will see this same LCD installation completed during the fall of this school year. Our advances in technology over the past three years have been tremendous. We have gone from a district of chalkboards and limited technology to one that is truly preparing students for the technological world in which we live.

At McCourt and North Cumberland Middle Schools, we are proud to be launching our 1 to 1 Chrome Book Computer initiative for our students and teachers. The use of Chrome Books will help redefine how we look at teaching and learning here in Cumberland. Students will now have an educational platform to learn at their level, and challenge themselves. Teachers will be able expand how they teach and facilitate student learning.

PROGRAM ENHANCEMENTS

This fall, Cumberland High School will be running a new Biotechnology pathway program called Project Lead the Way.

This hands-on science program is the beginning of a series of courses designed to prepare students for future careers in this field of study. New Advanced Placement courses in AP Microeconomics, AP Geography, and AP Studio Art are also in place for the fall. In music, we continue to expand, this year with a new Percussion Ensemble class.

The 2014-2015 school year will also see the first year of our new Freshman Academy, a program designed specifically to meet the educational and social emotional needs of students in this very important transitional year in each student's educational career.

At the Middle Schools, an Instrumental Band Program is now in place. This program, previously cut from the middle schools years back, will afford students more opportunities in instrumental music.

GRADING

Also at the Middle Schools, we are implementing our new Standards Based Report Card (implemented last year at the K-5 level). This more detailed report card provides students and parents much more detail on a student's strengths and areas for improvement. Students won't just get a grade of 85 for math, but rather, get several more detailed grades on different focus areas within math like Geometry and Measurement or Functions and Algebra. This more precise measurement of student learning allows students, parents, and teachers a better understanding on how to meet each student's needs and truly understand what each student knows and is able to do.



These findings have held consistent across the decades. One example of such a study comes from the National Center for Educational Accountability, which found that an AP Exam score, and a score of 3 or higher in particular, is a strong predictor of a student's ability to persist in college and earn a bachelor's degree.
